Lead by example

hildren learn to model what they see their parents do. When you make Mass a regular priority in your family life, go to confession, or practice prayer at home, they're seeing what an active faith looks like in practice – and those habits can foster a greater interest in their faith later on.

- + Make attending Mass a priority every week.
- + Pray often in front of your children, and invite them to pray with you.
- + Teach them about the lives and examples of the saints.
- + Help make weekly services memorable or exciting by building habits around them (ie. make a fun meal/snack, go out for donuts, play/sing special music in the car, have a family game time before or after Mass)
- + Regularly attend Confession and Adoration, and explain why these sacraments are important.

Talk about your faith

M any children grow up witnessing their parents practice their faith, but don't ever directly talk about the faith in their family. By providing a space where kids can ask you questions and engage with you, your children can grow in their curiosity about what it means to be Catholic, and ultimately build a faith that is their own.

- + Explain why certain practices of the faith are personally important to you.
- + Ask them what they thought about the service. Did they learn anything? Do they understand what is happening?
- + Turn off the car radio or the TV a few times a week and spend the time talking about spiritual matters with your children.
- + Read the Bible together.
